Debora McDermed most recently served as the Director of Community Engagement for the Bridges To a Thriving Nevada Initiative. During the three year period in this capacity, Debora trained over 3000 people in the Bridges Out of Poverty constructs; designed programs to imbed this work in business, criminal justice, and social services. Additionally, she designed follow-on curriculum in emotional resiliency, leadership and financial stability, and is currently developing a leader's guide to assist organizations in managing economic diversity. Prior to moving into community work, Debora has been a Transformational Leadership Consultant to the fortune 500 for over 15 years. Her specialty is in the field of human development and what fosters and sustains human change.

AAUW advocates for all women to achieve economic self-sufficiency. Debora will give us insights on the obstacles that stand in the way of that happening for those in poverty as well as a direction that can be taken.

Schermer Pecan Co. guarantees their freshness for two years when stored in a freezer.

Please begin taking orders from your friends and neighbors. Be sure to order some for yourself. Feel free to take some packages to sell even if you have not received any orders. You do not have to pay for them at the time you take them. Shirley will write your name on a list, and if you cannot sell all the packages, you may return the unsold packages to me.

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
