As Jennifer pointed out in a recent communication, "AAUW's Work Smart is a quick, cost-effective, and proven tactic for reducing the pay gap. The material is easily digestible. Research on our workshops shows a 150% improvement in skills and 91% improvement in confidence to negotiate. These workshops are not "talk"; they are effective action that directly begins to close the wage gap, NOW!"

OUR Capital Branch has sponsored two of these workshops and another is planned on April 28th (see box below). This is one of our branch's community programs and is provided at NO charge to participants. Come on March 6th and learn how YOU can help fill up the workshop!

The October 2017 AAUW Work Smart workshop results are in! Our October attendees were a high-powered group of professional women (65% of attendees had an MA). Yet, even this group of workplace savvy women showed over 100% change in many negotiation skills and as well as a 50% change in confidence to negotiate. LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Question: What local scholarships are provided by the Capital (NV) Branch?

Answer: We have typically provided at least two \$1000 scholarships to graduating high school senior girls. The number for 2018-19FY will be determined at the April Business Meeting.

Question: How do graduating seniors find out about our scholarships?

Answer: Application packets are delivered to the counselors at local High Schools. AND information is posted on our website - <https://capital-nv.aauw.net/scholarships/>

Question: What are the screening deadlines and volunteer screener requirements?

Answer: Completed applications are due by April 13, 2018. Applications will be screened by AAUW volunteers. **Sign up at the March 6 Meeting! Mary Piper will be circulating a sign-up sheet!**

BRANCH MEETING RESERVATIONS

Question: Why are reservations required if I do not want a meal?

Answer: Tables and chairs are rearranged to allow for more socializing and exchange of information. We want to make sure everyone has a seat with a group.

Question: Why do I have to make my meal reservation by the Friday before the meeting?

Answer: Confirmation of the number of meals **must be given to the caterer.**

Question: Do I have to pay for my meal if I cannot make it to the meeting (sickness or change of plans)?

Answer: YES! According to our branch policies and procedures, the member is responsible for the meal reservation. You may receive an invoice for payment if you did not cancel before the reservation deadline.

Question: May I get a meal without a reservation?

Answer: If extra food is available, you may pay at the door. But this option is only available after all those with reservations have been served.


